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# 2.2 Empathy, Communication & Storytelling

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# Introduction

## Why talk about sustainability and what do we mean with this word?

**Sustainability** → *Meeting today's needs without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.*

It means finding a balance between three key dimensions:

**Environmental** – protecting natural resources and the climate

**Social** – ensuring rights, well-being, education and equal opportunities

**Economic** – creating growth and jobs without exploiting people or the environment



The climate crisis is also a *social issue* (health, work, equity) and the involvement of young people is fundamental because they are not only the recipients but also the agents of change:

- they will **experience the effects of climate, economic and social changes** for a longer time
- they will **inherit the consequences** of today's choices
- they represent the generation that can **change models of consumption, production and culture**

# Empathy, Communication, Storytelling

*Empathy, communication, and storytelling are deeply interconnected: stories foster empathy by allowing us to experience others' perspectives and emotions. By putting a human face on information, storytelling builds trust, enhances understanding, and makes messages more memorable and impactful across fields like business, education, and healthcare.*

**Storytelling** Activates Empathy: Engaging stories trigger mirror neurons, making us feel the characters' emotions as our own, and release oxytocin, fostering trust and connection.

**Empathy** Fuels Communication: Understanding an audience's thoughts, feelings, and concerns (using tools like empathy maps) allows for messages that resonate deeply, avoiding jargon and addressing "hot buttons" → the topics, needs, or worries that matter most to your audience and trigger strong emotional reactions.

**Communication** Shapes Stories: Empathetic communication designs stories to be audience-centric, focusing on relatable struggles and shared human experiences to increase impact and authenticity.



# Storytelling

## Why it works?

- Stories create emotional connections.
- They make complex topics understandable and memorable.
- They trigger identification: “That could be me.”



### Mini-Task:

Write a mini-story (max 100 words) or a script for a social media post about the topic of sustainability and your experiences with it.

Prompt:

*“A sustainable choice that improves people's lives”*



### Example:

**Greenpeace** – Global environmental organization known for campaigns on climate, forests, oceans, and biodiversity, active on social media with strong, visual content.

- how they do visual storytelling (photos, videos, graphics)
- what key messages they use to engage their audience
- how they link concrete actions to personal values

*Lauren Singer*

Personal account of how and why she adopted a “zero-waste” lifestyle, with reflections on change, daily choices, and personal impact.

## Small Exercise:

- Which of these practices do you think could be applied in your daily life?
- Why do you think reducing waste is important for the planet and for people?

- What struck you most about the way she communicated her message?
- What “hot buttons” (important concerns or values) do you think the video touched on?

# Communication

## From message to action

### Why it matters?

Effective communication **prevents misunderstandings, captures attention**, and makes the **message impactful**. It is essential for building trust and transforming complex information into something understandable and accessible to everyone. In the case of sustainability, it helps people understand the urgency of the issue and can motivate small, concrete changes in behaviour, contributing to a real positive impact.

### Earth Overshoot Day – WWF

Earth Overshoot Day, the moment when humanity has used up all the resources that the Earth can regenerate in a year.

### What makes communication effective and of good quality?

- It is **clear** and **easy to understand**.
- It is tailored to its **target audience**.
- It uses concrete and **understandable examples**.
- It engages through **emotion** and **empathy**.
- It is based on **credible information**.
- Includes a **call to action** when necessary

# Empathy

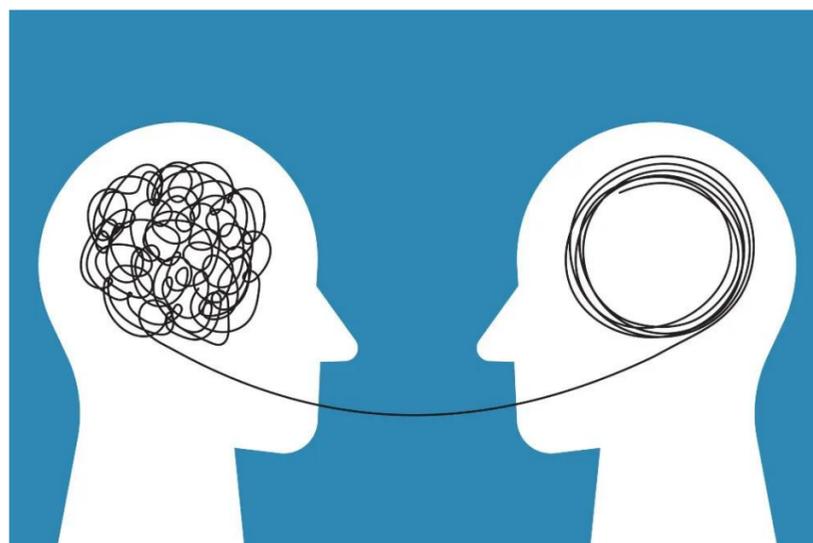
## But what do we mean by empathy? What are the key concepts?

Empathy is the **ability to understand and share the feelings, thoughts, and emotions of others**, putting yourself in their shoes without judging.

It allows you to **communicate more authentically, build trust, and engage people**. It helps to better understand complex issues and motivate responsible behaviour.

### How to use it in communication:

- Tailor the message to the audience and their needs.
- Use stories, examples, and images that bring the situation to life.
- Show the consequences of actions on people, the environment, or the community.
- It helps create an emotional connection, making the message more memorable and persuasive.

For example, empathy is key to environmental sustainability and a **just transition** → the shift to a green economy that leaves no one behind. By understanding the real impacts of climate change and climate policies on people and communities, we can create inclusive solutions that protect the planet while ensuring fairness and social justice.



# Empathy

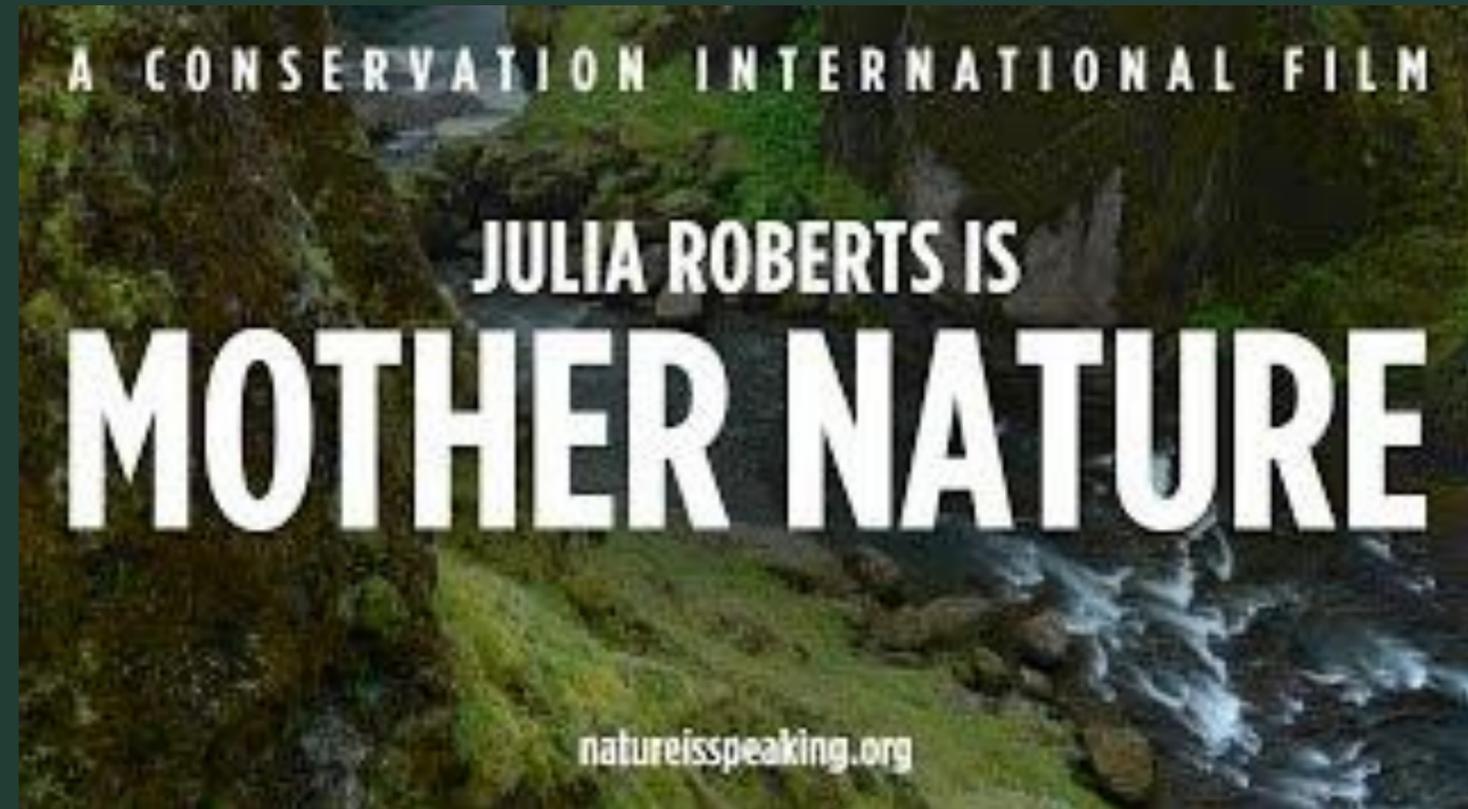

The use of graphics and images makes it easy to understand environmental issues and the consequences of our actions, while characters and stories **encourage empathy** and identification, prompting people to reflect and take action for a more sustainable future.

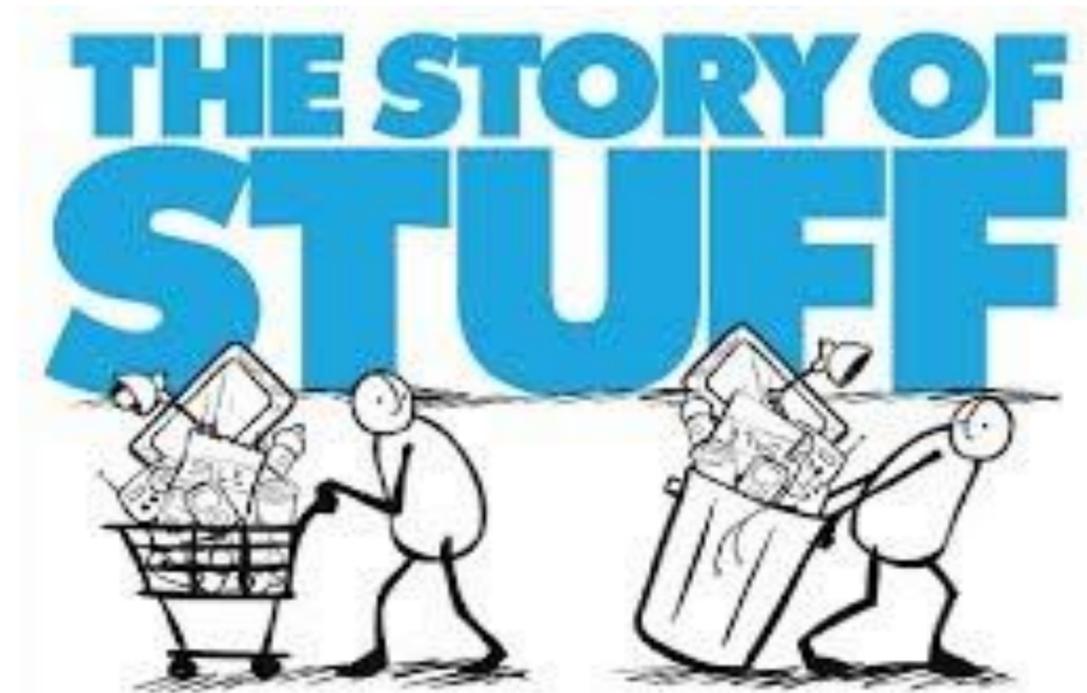
## Small Exercise:

# Sustainability in action:

## What to remember



Talking about environmental sustainability is important because it allows us to understand the consequences of our actions, protect the planet, and build a better future for everyone.

To make these messages effective, data alone is not enough: **clear communication, storytelling, and empathy** are also needed.

Telling stories and putting ourselves in the shoes of people, animals, or natural elements helps to engage emotionally, make problems concrete, and motivate responsible behaviour.

Getting people involved is essential: *only when everyone feels part of the change is it possible to build a true green transition* and transform awareness into concrete action.

### Summary pills of this module:
